

A Message from the President and CEO and Board Chair

In 2024, the Arizona Alliance for Community Health Centers (AACHC) and our network of Community Health Centers (CHCs) stood at the intersection of rising need and unyielding commitment. Nearly 60 years after the Health Center Program was born out of the Civil Rights Movement, our role in Arizona's health care landscape has never been more vital - or more urgent.

Our members and partners screened more than 17,000 patients for intimate partner violence, enrolled over 55,000 Arizonans in AHCCCS and KidsCare, and supported thousands more through Marketplace, SNAP, and WIC.

Advocacy was front and center. We brought together state partners to align on key safety net priorities and served as a trusted voice for Arizona's health centers at the federal level. Visits from U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra amplified the impact of our Navigator teams.

We continued to expand access to care through innovation and infrastructure. CHCs across the state opened new sites and completed key expansion and renovation projects.

In Maricopa County, Narcan vending machines were installed at CHCs to offer free, anonymous access to a life-saving overdose reversal drug.

Internally, AACHC brought together HR, workforce, and training teams under a new People and Culture department to strengthen staff well-being, leadership development, and workforce excellence.

The challenges remain – funding, workforce, and a changing health care landscape - but our vision is clear: primary healthcare for all.

Thank you to our staff, partners, and supporters who make our mission possible. The time is now. Together, we'll keep building a stronger, healthier Arizona.



Advocacy and Community Engagement

Advancing Advocacy: Statewide and National Impact

In 2024, the external affairs team for the Arizona Alliance for Community Health Centers (AACHC) strengthened its role as a trusted voice in policy, driving progress at both the state and federal levels. At home. the team convened a coalition of state partners focused on key provider-side issues - from AHCCCS policy to protecting Medicaid access. This collaboration helped shape a unified voice across Arizona's health care safety net.

A major milestone was the formation of a new external affairs team, composed of the chief external affairs officer, a newly added communications director, and a newly added director of legislative affairs. These new positions expanded AACHC's capacity to lead strategic communications and policy advocacy, strengthening the organization's voice at the Capitol and in communities across Arizona.

Federally, the team arranged multiple visits from HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra, reinforcing Arizona's leadership in community health. Events like Capitol Hill visits, site tours, and town halls helped members of Congress connect with local communities - with several turning to AACHC for support on communitybuilding efforts.

To support advocacy, the communications team produced clear, effective tools such as Catalyst, a monthly messaging brief, and Media Trends Weekly, a curated health policy scan. These, along with targeted toolkits and op-eds, helped health centers and advocates deliver aligned, persuasive messages.

Together, these efforts continue to raise the visibility and influence of Arizona's community health centers across all levels of government.





Domestic and Sexual Violence

Finding Support in a Time of Crisis

After fleeing domestic violence, a pregnant woman arrived in southern Arizona with no belongings and took a job in the fields to support herself and her child. A local Community Health Worker connected her with a Domestic and Sexual Violence Advocate at Chiricahua Community Health Centers (CCHCI), who helped her access vital resources.

With emergency safety funds, the advocate provided clothes, kitchen items, and winter essentials. Donations of mattresses and furniture replaced the cold trailer floor where she had been sleeping. She was also connected to AHCCCS, a sliding fee program, and additional support from TMC's rural program and Child & Family Resources.

Thanks to this network of care, she gave birth to a healthy baby boy and began to rebuild her life.

No Questions, Just Help: Narcan Vending Machines Save Lives Across Maricopa County

Arizona's Community Health Centers (CHCs) are stepping up in the fight against the opioid crisis — one vending machine at a time.

In early 2024, Narcan vending machines began appearing at health centers across Maricopa County. These machines distribute naloxone (commonly known as Narcan), a life-saving medication that reverses opioid overdoses. They also provide fentanyl and xylazine test strips and other supplies — all free and anonymous.

Installed at Valle del Sol, Terros Health, Adelante Healthcare, and Circle the City — with more on the way — the machines are placed in communities with high overdose rates to ensure the greatest impact. Some are free-standing, while others are wall-mounted, depending on space and site needs.

Each machine includes clear instructions for administering Narcan. No personal information is required, and users can access them without fear or judgment. The goal is simple: reduce overdose deaths by making naloxone easy to get and easy to use.

CHCs also support the initiative with training sessions, printed materials, and community outreach.

Early results from three sites show more than 1,000 doses of Narcan distributed between January and July, along with hundreds of test strips. One clinic reported six overdose reversals in the first month alone.

These numbers represent lives saved. And they reflect the vital role CHCs play — not only in providing care, but in responding to urgent community needs with compassion, access, and action.





Counting the Hands That Feed Us: Farmworker Enumeration Study Completed

The 2024 Arizona Farmworkers **Enumeration Profiles Study was finalized** and released in October, marking a major step forward in understanding the workforce that powers Arizona agriculture and helps feed the nation.

This comprehensive study estimates the number of crop, nursery-greenhouse, and animal agriculture workers across every Arizona county. These individuals — who harvest crops, tend livestock and aquaculture, support forestry operations, and work in food processing and packaging - are vital to Arizona's economy and to national food systems.

But until now, the state lacked a clear count of these essential workers and their households. That made it difficult to fully address their public health needs, deliver relevant services, or design effective support programs.

The study had two primary goals: first, to provide accurate, current estimates of farmworkers and their household members using rigorous, community-engaged research methods. Second, to assess how an academic-community-government team could effectively collaborate on farmworker enumeration — and how those findings might be used by public agencies, growers, researchers, and service providers.

The results of the 2024 study will help inform programs and services that support farmworkers and their families, ensuring they are counted, considered, and connected to the resources they need.





Outreach and Enrollment

National Recognition for Arizona's Navigator Network

In 2024, the Arizona Alliance for Community Health Centers (AACHC) welcomed U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra for two visits to our member health centers – both of which serve as Navigator partners.

During each visit, Secretary Becerra met directly with certified and licensed Navigators and engaged with community members who gained access to health coverage through Marketplace. These conversations offered insight into the impact of Navigator-led outreach and the critical role these efforts play in connecting Arizonans to affordable healthcare.

Roundtable discussions with the secretary highlighted the daily challenges and successes experienced by Navigators across the state. These visits provided meaningful opportunities for our outreach and enrollment team and Navigator partners to be recognized at the national level for their tireless work in advancing health coverage and healthcare access across Arizona.

Supporting Arizonans Through Medicaid Redetermination

During the Medicaid redetermination period, AACHC's outreach and enrollment team worked with government relations staff and other stakeholders to engage with AHCCCS on how the process was unfolding statewide. We provided input on improving AHCCCS's monthly data dashboard to better track how Arizonans were navigating coverage changes. AHCCCS also shared a statewide heat map highlighting high-priority areas at risk for coverage loss, allowing Community Health Centers and enrollment partners to focus outreach and resources where they were needed most. This collaboration helped protect access to care for thousands of Arizonans during a critical transition.





Outreach and Enrollment

Enrollment Services and Other Activities

Our Navigator and Healthy Kids programs, in partnership with the Cover Arizona Coalition, helped Community Health Centers and partners connect Arizonans to programs like the Marketplace, AHCCCS/KidsCare, SNAP, and WIC. Using the Cover Arizona hotline, referrals, events, and other outreach, we focus on reaching communities with less access to coverage.







New Professional Network

The Arizona Alliance for Community Healthcare Centers (AACHC) started a new Professional Networking Committee for Chief Information Officers and other HIT leaders within Community Health Centers (CHCs) to support the sharing of best practices and addressing the changing HIT landscape.

Leveraging Data to Drive Care Improvements

In 2024, the Health Center Controlled Network (HCCN) used insights from the Comprehensive HIT and Network Assessment to identify areas of greatest need and impact across the state. This informed targeted support for individual CHCs, as well as broader initiatives that benefit the entire network and advance value-based care.

Key efforts included collaborating with the Health Plan Association and Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) to better align strategies and coordination on behalf of CHCs. HCCN also conducted in-depth data analysis on member roster alignment, cost of care, and quality metrics – critical components in improving care delivery. To support ongoing improvement, HCCN developed a statewide data dashboard that allows health centers to benchmark their performance and use internal data to strengthen outcomes and decision-making.

Investing in Access: Capital Projects Move Forward

In 2024, two more capital improvement projects were completed as part of AACHC's commitment to expanding access to care. Circle the City's Downtown Family Health Center and Valle del Sol's Mesa Clinic both opened their doors, bringing the total to four of eight planned projects now complete.





Healthcare's Most Valuable Asset

2024 marked a transformative year for the Arizona Alliance for Community Health Centers (AACHC) with the creation of the People and Culture department. This new department brought together the HR, workforce, and training and events teams under one umbrella to support organizational development, employee well-being, and workforce excellence.

Among its early accomplishments, the workforce team secured accreditation from the Arizona Medical Association - a milestone that underscores AACHC's commitment to high-quality healthcare workforce development.

The HR team launched a new employee wellness program aimed at building a culture of well-being. Through regular challenges focused on better sleep, mindful eating, physical activity, and time spent outdoors, employees were encouraged to set personal goals and support one another's progress.

The training and events team also expanded professional development offerings. Notably, they introduced NACHC's New Clinical Leaders Training and the highly requested Five Functions of a Team Training. These programs have helped Community Health Center leaders strengthen team collaboration and leadership skills across the state.

With these achievements, the People and Culture department has laid a foundation for continued growth - fostering a workplace where employees are engaged, supported, and empowered to succeed.




